

## Launch of a new #ConnectedNature Global Partnership on Ecological Connectivity

## CMS COP14 Special Event

Ecological connectivity is a vital conservation priority and essential for migratory species. As a result it is a key priority for CMS. But ecological connectivity has also been recognized as a priority for restoration, area-based conservation, climate change and other global policy objectives, in particular the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework.

This special event marks the launch of a new **Global Partnership on Ecological Connectivity (GPEC).** The GPEC will facilitate efforts to address key priorities for ecological connectivity, identify and address gaps and scale-up national-level, transboundary and international connectivity conservation and restoration policies and activities.

This will be achieved through a collaborative multistakeholder network of partners focused on four key areas of work:

- 1) data, research and monitoring,
- 2) policy and legislation,
- 3) uptake and implementation and
- 4) awareness raising and outreach.

It will also aim to scale up and leverage funding to support these areas of work to achieve concrete, measurable results.
